## Prosperity

The Dutch economy is built on trade. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs uses its network and experience to help Dutch businesses big and small sell their products and services globally. The ministry works hard to ensure businesses can operate on a level playing field and that trade is fair and sustainable. The ministry also supports exports and international investments, opens up new markets and facilitates access to knowledge and raw materials. Through trade the Netherlands maintains close ties with many countries.



## Stability and resilience

Instability is a breeding ground for terrorism, people smuggling and other forms of crime. Together with our partners, we work to combat this by ensuring aid reaches areas ravaged by war where people are fleeing violence. Our aim is to promote stability and foster resilience by improving living conditions for these and other vulnerable populations. We are also actively involved in mediation and in blocking terrorist financing and stopping arms trafficking.



## Sustainable peace

Peace requires justice. A world where 'might is right' is not in the Netherlands' interests. That's why we work with our partners to promote the international legal order. All people are entitled to freedom, dignity and equality. The Netherlands has made international commitments to tackle global challenges such as poverty, disease, food scarcity and climate change. We also work to support economic resilience, better healthcare, food security, clean drinking water and access to justice in developing countries.



## Consular services

Our embassies, consulates and the 24/7 BZ Contact Centre are standing by day and night, ready to assist Dutch nationals. We help them renew their passports, we provide travel advice and we offer assistance during times of political unrest or in the wake of a natural disaster. We also provide visa services to people wishing to visit the Netherlands.

## Our missions

### Embassies

The Netherlands has an extensive global network of embassies, consulates-general, business support offices and honorary consulates. They represent the Kingdom of the Netherlands and are referred to as 'missions'.

Dutch embassies represent the Kingdom of the Netherlands (the Netherlands, Aruba, Curaçao and St Maarten) abroad. They are based in the city in which the seat of a country's government is located. Embassies are responsible for fostering good relations and promoting Dutch interests in the countries in which they are based. In addition to providing services for Dutch nationals, they also provide visas and other consular services for non-Dutch nationals.

Our embassies also maintain partnerships with businesses, government organisations and NGOs abroad. This enables them to support Dutch businesses in their international operations.

### Consulates-general

In large countries or countries with several major cities or regions the Netherlands often has a consulate as well as an embassy. Consulates report to embassies and promote the economic interests of the Netherlands. They also often provide consular services. In some countries the Netherlands has two or more consulates.

### Permanent missions and representations

Permanent missions and representations promote the interests of the Netherlands within international organisations, such as the United Nations and the European Union.

### Other missions

Netherlands Business Support Offices (NBSO) are an example of another type of mission. The primary function of NBSOs is to support small and medium-sized Dutch enterprises in their global operations. They also promote Dutch trade and investment. NBSOs are located in areas that are of particular interest to Dutch business but where there is no embassy or consulate. The Netherlands Trade and Investment Office (NTIO) and embassy offices are other types of missions.

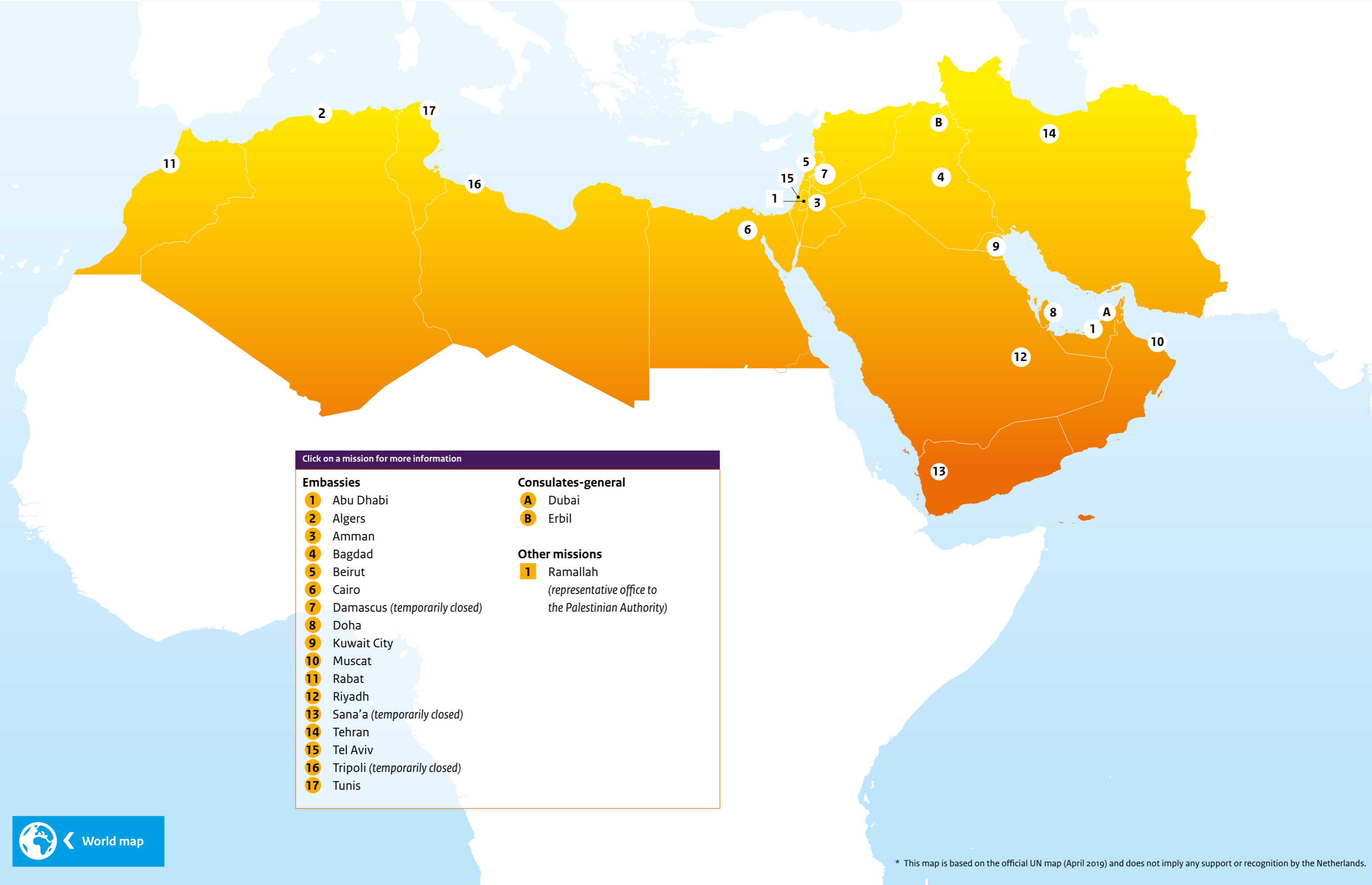
